Words Doing What They Say:

Text as a Visual Image

PRIMARY OBJECTIVE:

• Students will **create** a 2-dimensional image using a descriptive word, and reinforce the word's concept/idea by the way it is presented, using **letter style** and **color** alone.

SECONDARY OBJECTIVES:

- Students will manipulate the elements of design (line, shape, color, value, texture, and space) and the
 principles of design (balance, unity, contrast, and movement) to create an image using text style and color
 to communicate a concept/theme
- Students will **utilize a specific color harmony** within their image, using color to add to the effectiveness of their work.
- Explore the artmaking process through brainstorming, thumbnails, execution, and critique.
- Students will apply the four aspects of aesthetic scanning to a **verbal or written critique** of their work and at least one of their peer's artwork.

MATERIALS:

- 18"x12" final product
- Color paper
- sharpie markers
- pencils
- prismacolor pencils
- watercolor pencils
- color markers

PROCESS:

- 1) Brainstorm a list of active verbs, and descriptive nouns. You may do this as a group. Select a word that would be interesting to depict
- 2) Create a page of thumbnails exploring visual flow, color harmony, focal point, balance, and rhythm/movement.
- 3) After thumbnail approval and feedback (from teacher *and* peers), transfer idea VERY lightly to the final paper
- 4) Finish your word concept in a high quality, polished fashion on high quality, white paper.
- 5) Cut out the finished product, and mount in on a 12"x18" colored paper that completes your color harmony.
- 6) Add detail on the background that ties into the image as a whole.
